

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Message from the Vice-President, Health

The Year 3 Plan in Action report of UBC Health's strategic plan, *Better Health Together* (2021-2026), highlights our progress and achievements over the past year as we advance interprofessional health education, interdisciplinary research, and integrated health systems across British Columbia.

Since the inception of this strategic plan, UBC Health has fostered collaborations that bridge disciplines and sectors, driving impactful change in health outcomes, equity, and systems. This year, we expanded our reach in several critical areas, including:


- **Research Collaborations:** Through initiatives like the Health Innovation Funding Investment and Ministry of Health Seed Grants, we have enabled over 100 interdisciplinary projects addressing critical priorities, from healthy aging to health equity.
- Health Systems Partnership: UBC Health acts as a bridge between the university and health sector partners, hosting annual cross-sector dialogue events to foster collaboration and innovation. It also facilitates TBC@UBC Network events, engaging over 560 members from academia, government, health authorities, health professionals, and patient and community groups to discuss integration of evidence into practice and advance primary healthcare and health education.
- **Education Innovation:** Set to open on campus in 2025, the Gateway to team-based care will pave the way for the future of team-based primary care in BC, developing and testing models of team-based education and practice that can be scaled across the province.
- **Community and Patient Engagement:** With a strong commitment to inclusion, we continue to expand patient and community involvement in our programming, ensuring diverse perspectives shape the future of health education and research.

As we approach the mid-point of our five-year strategic plan, we are more committed than ever to supporting and expanding partnerships that drive meaningful impact. This upcoming year, we will conduct a comprehensive mid-term evaluation to assess our progress. I am grateful to our governance, partners and stakeholders, staff, faculty and students for their continued dedication to advancing health for all.

Together, we are creating a healthier future for British Columbia and beyond.



Expanded Placements


Education Strategic Objective #2

In the inaugural strategic plan, UBC Health committed to helping UBC's health-related programs to develop models that build placement capacity and promote collaborative placements across British Columbia.

This is a priority area where we are actively working to ramp up our collective efforts. UBC Health is building on the successful integration of interprofessional classroom-based learning and focusing more on supporting programs across the province to facilitate interprofessional placements.

We continue to support an active practice education network across UBC that meets regularly to address issues that impact clinical placements across programs.

We are also engaged in the extensive work required to establish a team-based teaching clinic on campus (Gateway to Team-Based Care), which will enable us to develop interprofessional placement models that can be scaled across the province.



Education Ecosystem in Team-Based Care

Education Strategic Objective #3

Establishing the Gateway to Team-Based Care—linking teaching clinics across the province to serve as learner-informed models for team-based education, is an ambitious goal in our strategic plan, towards which we have made significant progress over the past year.



The foundations have been laid for the Gateway to Team-Based Care, which will include a team-based teaching clinic on the UBC Point Grey campus—set to open in 2025. This year we accomplished the following:



Clinical space design, including the use of technology



 Creation of faculty and staff roles that will support innovations in care and learning



 Understanding the primary care placement needs across health professional programs



 Identification of models of patient and community engagement

Where else could you bring together this breadth of disciplines to establish a primary care clinic?

Relationship-building and identifying best practices through engagement with individuals, teams, and organizations, across sectors, locally, provincially and globally are at the heart of our work. This includes formalizing synergies across the growing network of campus health clinics and engaging with other team-based clinics across BC to embed practices of interprofessional and collaborative education.

Data infrastructure

Research Strategic Objective #3

Since hosting a series of sessions to discuss the responsibilities of researchers and UBC as an institution around the collection and use of disaggregated data (see UBC Health Plan in Action: Year 1), we have been exploring the best ways for UBC Health to contribute to ongoing provincial efforts to develop an integrated health research data infrastructure. Over 250 participants involved in our Disaggregated Data Dialogue Series have contributed to advancing our collective understanding of how disaggregated data can be used to address inequalities and advance human rights. This work is systems-oriented and will require applied work, partnerships—with organizations such as the Health Data Coalition, Canadian Primary Care Sentinel Surveillance Network, and BC Primary Health Care Research Network.



Facilitating the application of advances in education and research through inclusive and coordinated engagement with practitioners, communities, and policymakers.

Public and patient engagement

Health Systems Strategic Objective #1

One of the successful aspects of UBC Health in this area has been to enhance student learning by engaging those with lived experiences to support the development and delivery of our interprofessional programs. We are now expanding our patient and community engagement across all areas of our work to advance diverse community priorities, enhance learner experiences, and align research activities.



One of this year's highlights is the active involvement of patients and community members on the UBC Health Patient and Community Advisory Committee, as interprofessional workshop facilitators, on research initiative adjudication committees, and within strategic initiative steering committees and advisory groups. As we increasingly collaborate with patients and community members, we are actively working to ensure the inclusion of marginalized and underrepresented groups and facilitate the equitable participation of all voices.




Coordinated responses


Evidence for new approaches

UBC Health Awards 2024




UBC Health held its annual awards celebration in June 2024, recognizing outstanding contributions in health education, research, and interprofessional collaboration. The awardees included students, faculty, and community educators who exemplify excellence in their fields. The following award recipients were celebrated through UBC Health Awards:

- John McNeill Excellence in Health Research Mentorship Award recognized Dr. Victoria Bungay from the School of Nursing for her exceptional mentorship and establishment of the Capacity Research Unit, which promotes community-based health research and interventions.
- John F. McCreary Prize for Interprofessional Teamwork was presented to the UBC Centre for Cardiovascular Innovation (CCI-CIC) team, led by David Wood, for the team's interdisciplinary approach to cardiovascular research and clinical trial administration.
- R. Paul Kerston Community Educator Award, Sheftel and Karen Firus for their dedication to student mentorship and health education.

- Professor Jessie Gordon MacCarthy Memorial Scholarship was awarded to Manpreet Alisha Buttar, a Master of Science in Human Nutrition student, for her leadership in community and population health.

The progress celebrated in this report demonstrates the areas in which UBC Health has been able to play a leadership role, convening, facilitating, and enabling collaboration and collective action while promoting and supporting the activities of the partners who share our vision.

The next phase in our work will be the mid-term evaluation, which will assess how our interest holders and partners have engaged with UBC Health's work. Feedback from colleagues and partners who share our commitments will solidify areas of work to which we need to re-commit, indicate any need for course

correction, and help identify new opportunities for collaboration and collective impact. This mid-term evaluation will inform our planning for the next two years of our strategic plan, and will also prepare us for initial conversations about our new strategic plan in 2027.

In the fourth year of the strategic plan, UBC Health will welcome a new cohort of directors in interprofessional education, interdisciplinary research, and health systems who will play instrumental roles in continuing to advance our current collective goals and objectives while setting a vision for the future.
